

Remember -

- Use condoms as a back-up method of birth control the first week you start using the patch.
- Always change your patch on the same day of the week.

Watch for these warning signs

Sudden severe headache that won't go away

Eye problems (blurry or double vision, loss of vision)

Shortness of breath or coughing blood

Feeling weak or numb on one side of your body

Sharp, sudden pain in your leg, chest or belly

If you have any of these warning signs, call Adagio

If the office is closed, go to the emergency room.

Remember

Tell any health care provider that you visit that you are on birth control. A health care provider is a doctor, nurse, hospital, clinic or anyone who gives you medical care.

If there is any change in your medical information (like a new medicine you are taking) tell the Adagio Health Staff or any other health care provider.

You should not smoke while using the patch. Smoking can increase your chance of having a stroke, heart attack or other health problems.

The patch does not protect against HIV or any other STD (sexually transmitted disease). An STD is a disease that you can get from having sex. Condoms can help keep you safe from some STDs including HIV.
